

Making a Patch from Your Embroidery



Making a decorative patch out of your embroidery is a great way to take your embroidery from it's normal and be able to add it to those no-way-to-hoop things like a drawer front, chair or baskets and more.



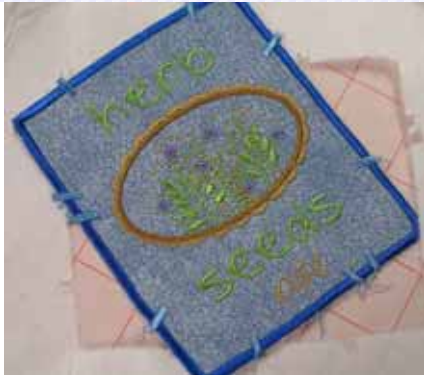
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Hoop a piece of Floriani tear away or something that will tear all away like Pellon stitch and tear. This patch design is set for appliqué so you will do the marking lines and fabric placements according to directions.



When the embroidery part is finished just "punch out" the design. This leaves you with only the stitched patch. Notice the stabilizer makes it possible for even the little sticking out tag stitches to stay fine. They are delicate, so be careful till we have the backing on them.



Turn the patch face down on a Teflon ironing sheet. Then add a piece of Wonder Under, Steam a Seam 2 or Stitch witchery over the back. Iron on according to directions. Stitch Witchery will require the pressing sheet folded over the back again.



Let it cool and remove the paper backing if there is one. Now it is a patch and you can iron it on any place that allows for ironing. You can also add some fabric tack glue if needed for those not able to iron places.
